#### Mrs Winspear who led the visit reports:

'Last Thursday 42 Year 11 geographers headed to sunny Redcar to complete their GCSE fieldwork. Fieldwork is an important part of geography as it gives pupils the opportunity to develop and extend their geographical thinking to the real world.

Our geographers spent the morning on the beach investigating coastal processes and gathering some great primary data. Pupils showed impressive team work and problem-solving skills, working in very windy conditions.

After lunch we moved onto our human geography locations on the seafront and high street to gather data on the regeneration of Redcar. Pupils impressed staff once more when asking the public to complete their questionnaires. This can be a nervewracking experience and our pupils tackled it with great maturity and good manners.

Pupils will collate, present and analyse their data back in the classroom to prepare for their Paper 3 exam in June.'

#### Success for musicians at Eskdale Festival for Whitby pupils

Mrs Edmondes-Preedy and Mrs Beattie (CCW) took over 100 pupils from Caedmon and Eskdale to the Eskdale Festival at the Spa Pavilion in Whitby. The pupils ate together before competing against each other in a friendly competition!

It was good to see so many pupils performing. For some, it was their first time on a big stage outside of school, experiencing participating in a music competition and nerves did take over. Others rose to the occasion and took it in their stride.

The Year 13 and under mixed ensemble with voices was won by a band from Eskdale School with seven pupils from a mixture of Year 9, Year 10 and Year 11. They performed Count on Me by Bruno Mars and Sweet Child o' Mine by Guns N' Roses. All the performers in this group were praised for their technical competence, their phrasing and dynamic contrasts. They were awarded a distinction. Competing against them and also gaining a distinction mark were the Caedmon Funk Band, who performed Stevie Wonder's 'Superstition' and 'Hi Ho Silver Lining' by Jeff Beck, in addition to the Year 10 GCSE class from Caedmon who also performed a very tight and well-rehearsed duo of pieces. 




### **Red Nose Day**

#### WoW Project 'Whitby our Whitby'

This project organised by 'The Literacy Trust' was a five-week long project, where students worked in groups of their choosing to highlight an area of their local community where they felt things could be better.

They then worked in their groups to present their research and suggest ways the situation could be improved. The final session took place on Wednesday 22 November. A panel of local business and charity figures were on hand to judge the efforts and to pass comment on how the presentations could be improved.

- » Group 1 were Emily, Eva and Lexie, who spoke about the need for greater sporting opportunities for girls in the local area.
- Scroup 2 had a single speaker, Finlay, who presented a case for better transport links around the town and how access for some groups was severely challenging.
- Scroup 3 were Evelyn, Carys, and Safi. This group were particularly impressive in delivering their thoughts on marginalised groups in the local community, they spoke very powerfully about the normalisation of offensive language and the desire they had to overcome this in school.
- Solution 3 Group 4 featured Charlie and Zach, and they spoke about their desire to change the timings of the school day, specifically making it shorter to facilitate more time to explore their own interests.

- Scroup 5 features Jaxson and Callum and they explored the topic of a previously unknown (to me) group of individuals called 'Furries' who enjoy dressing as cartoon animals.
- Soup 6 and 7 were large groups, but most vocal among them were Emmie, Amelia, Dakota and Kaycee who again advocated changes in the operation of the school, with uniform and homework in particular in the firing line.
- Sroup 8 was led by Alisha and she advocated the need for beach wheelchairs to allow disabled people better access to the beach.
- Scroup 9 was Freddie and Finley who explored the complex issue of second home owners in Whitby, with ideas about how some of their wealth could be better distributed in the community.

The project ended with a celebration event with cake!

The students involved enjoyed stepping out of their comfort zones and in particular those who spoke benefitted from experiencing the fear only public speaking can produce!



#### **Financial Help**

A Sixth Form bursary is available for WSF students to apply for if you have a household income of less than £28,000.

St Hilda's Bursary: This is available for all students to apply for. You can use the St Hilda's bursary for anything that enriches your life experiences.

The Paul Hogarth Bursary: Last year Paul Hogarth passed away. He was an integral part of ICL Boulby Mine for 27 years, as well as his role as a Central Overseer at ICL Boulby, Paul and his family ran their family farm near Whitby and all his children studied at Caedmon College Whitby/Whitby Sixth Form. Paul was an early enthusiast for Polysulphate, a product which ICL Boulby now mines.

The Hogarth family along with ICL Boulby (Cleveland Potash) launched the Paul Hogarth Bursary.

The bursary awarded is £5000 for each year of study at university, this could be for a 3 or 4 year course.

The bursary is not means tested, therefore anyone intending to study at University and is a student at WSF can apply.

This year the bursary was awarded to Grace Fuller.


### Why study History at WSF

#### What will I study?

History is packed full of the greatest characters you could ever wish to see on the TV or stage and they don't get any bigger than Henry VIII or more fascinating than the colossal struggle during the cold war between the leaders of America and Russia. Immerse yourself in the sixteenth century with the Tudors and use the cold war to help you to understand the state of the world today. All of the course is brand new learning and is accessible to anyone with a willingness to learn and a passion for the past!

#### What do students do afterwards?

In recent years, our A-level history students have gone on to study a wide variety of subjects including history (of course!), Egyptology, archaeology, teaching or any other degree course.



#### How will I be assessed?

80% exam at the end of the course, with 20% of coursework completed between Years 12 and 13.

#### What can I do to prepare?

Talk to other students who are already doing the course and ask them what they have done or wish they had done. Come and talk to one of the teachers who will be happy to discuss the content and style of learning in more depth. Send us an email if you can't come and see us. Read some history - any period; reading relevant books is always good preparation.

Letter from the Headteacher, The Viking No.81

Mr John Oakden Potter, Headmaster of Whitby School 1966-1983

#### THE HEADMASTER'S LETTER

1968-9

As I write this letter at the end of the Spring Term, I have very mixed feelings about 1968-9. This term has been a very difficult one—bad weather, electricity failure, North Sea gas conversion, and all the attendant cancellations, postponements, re-organisations and so on have caused many headaches.

Last September saw two school records broken—a total school population of over 400 for the first time, and a sixth form of over 100. We had a first form of 76, and would have made them into 3 forms if we had had room. But we had no room!—The problem of space was so critical that we had to put classes and private study in the pavilion, a situation made just about tolerable by the installation of electric convector heaters in there. It is not ideal but at least it gives us a little room to manoeuvre. The numbers in our sixth form sets have made it necessary to create 2 sets for English and Geography and while this has increased the number of subject combinations available it has added to staffing and accommodation problems.

don't think we can be accused of dragging our feet—some would say we are doing so many 'new' things that we are losing sight of a Grammar School's traditional values. I hope we shall never do this, even when we are no longer a Grammar School in the traditional sense of the word. Our traditions of work and conduct are the base on which we must build the school which will, before long, replace this one, and the new building in its academic and moral sense must have a firm foundation. Innovations should not replace what is good in the past, they should enhance it. I hope you will remember this and that 1968-9 will be remembered in the words of our newly-adopted school hymn, in which we sing "May we love and serve each other".
